It is with great sorrow that we the Northwest Arkansas Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Council mourn the death of Tyre Nichols. We are outraged and heartbroken at this senseless act of violence that took the life of yet another African American man and father. We stand in solidarity with Tyre's family, friends, and the greater community as they seek justice and healing from this tragic loss. No life should be taken in such a violent and heartbreaking way. In his 1963 "I Have a Dream" speech, Dr. King articulated that "We can never be satisfied as long as the Negro is the victim of the unspeakable horrors of police brutality."

As we reflect on this loss, we are reminded of the harsh reality of racial injustice that continues to plague our nation. We must take this tragedy as an opportunity to reflect on the legacy of Dr. King, who was also killed in Memphis, TN, more than 50 years ago.
